Driver in fatal crash had past DUI

Motorcyclist was killed in collision

The driving privileges of the woman who is accused of driving drunk when she struck and killed a woman on a motorcycle Tuesday night had been canceled indefinitely in 2011, according to Maricopa County Superior Court documents.

Veronica Muckerman, 32, of

Tempe, was driving a black GMC Yukon west on Broadway Road at about 5:50 p.m. when she failed to yield while turning left onto Rural Road, striking a motorcycle driven by 21-yearold Elsa Tovar, court documents sav. Tovar was pronounced dead at a Scottsdale hospital.

Muckerman, who had her 9and 12-year-old daughters in the SUV with her, showed signs of impairment, authorities said. None of the vehicle's occupants was injured.

She submitted to a Breathalyzer test, which showed a blood-alcohol content of at least 0.137 percent, according to court documents. The legal driving limit is .08 percent.

A history check with the Arizona Motor Vehicle Division found her driver's license had been revoked indefinitely because of an extreme DUI conviction in 2011.

She was arrested and booked into Tempe jail on one count each of manslaughter and aggravated DUI with a suspended or revoked license, and three counts of aggravated DUI, court records say.

Tempe's second in three days involving a driver who was believed to be impaired.

At about 9 a.m. Sunday, Kaylynn Ruth Kayanie, 25, was driving west on Broadway "at a high rate of speed" when she ran a red light and struck another vehicle that was traveling south on Priest Drive, Tempe Police Department spokeswoman Molly Enright says.

The driver of the southbound vehicle, a 45-year-old woman, was ejected and taken to the hospital with life-threatening

She was still in the hospital Wednesday morning, though police did not have an update on her condition, Enright said.

Two pedestrians who were in the crosswalk heading south on Priest at the time of the collision were hit by flying debris and taken to the hospital, where they were treated for cuts and bruises and released the same day, she said.

Impairment does appear to be a factor in that case and investigators are awaiting drug-test results, Enright said.

The soulful sound of "Calling All Angels" wafted through the still air Wednesday as more than 100 people raised lit candles into the night sky in memory of a father and son fatally shot in their home.

Parish Ocampo, 21, and his father, Ulises Ocampo, 46, died March 8 after two masked men barged into the family's southeast Phoenix house. The family's dog also was shot but sur-

Mari Ocampo attended the candlelight vigil at Civic Space Park for her husband and son but was too distraught to speak with the media. She and her younger son, Justin, were hiding when the intruders broke into the house after 2 a.m., po-

Jesus Parra, 21, of Phoenix met Parish while both attended the AGUILA Youth Leadership Institute. The nonprofit organization helps Latino youth gain access to higher education.

"He was a man of many labels, such as hard worker and fighter," Parra said before the start of the vigil in downtown Phoenix. "He was a guy I could relate to.

Parra said Parish recently was granted federal work authorization under the Obama administration's Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals pro-

Phoenix police spokesman Tommy Thompson has said that there is no new information in the case.

One assailant is described as Black, 6 feet 2 inches tall, weighing 230 pounds, and wearing a black T-shirt, jeans and a

bandanna over his face.

The other shooter is described as Black, 6 feet tall, weighing 200 pounds, and wearing a black long-sleeve shirt, black pants and a ski mask covering his head. Police believe both men are carrying hand-

PV officers combat burglaries

PARADISE VALLEY — Burglaries have trended up in Paradise Valley for about six months, but town officials continue to take measures to stay

ahead of the problem. There have been 18 burglaries in the town since the beginning of 2013, amounting to one-third of all the burglaries recorded last year.

Police Chief John Bennett said that as a response, he is using a variety of tactics to fight property crime, ranging from schedule adjustments to increased police presence.

Bennett said the Police Department has been canvassing neighborhoods in which burglaries have recently occurred.
